A core part of the charity's work is training sonographers who carry out pregnancy scans to have the confidence and skills to detect heart defects. The charity also places potentially life-saving pulse oximetry machines in maternity wards and spreads awareness of the key signs a baby may have an undiagnosed heart condition.

This includes the suspension of face-to-face meetings where printed information may have been shared, in favour of telephone or online consultations and meetings.
